Subject: Collinwood House

At the December 16, 2014 City Council meeting, the Council heard a discussion related to the Collinwood House located at Windhaven Meadows Park. Specifically, that the house was part of an 80 acre acquisition of land made in 2009 that completed the 124 acre park site. The house has not been incorporated into the plans for the park as it was originally deemed to not be of historic significance. Further, there is no funding to utilize the house in the park construction. The opinion of the house was revised when a new Historic Preservation Officer for the City was hired. After more research, it is believed that the house dates back to the 1860's. At the meeting in December, City Council directed staff to accept proposals to restore, protect, operate, and maintain the house in its current location.

On January 30, 2015, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was released which notified the public of an opportunity for "qualified parties" to enter into a lease agreement which would include rehabilitation and utilization of the Collinwood House in accordance with objectives stated within the RFP. The following requirement appeared in the RFP for determination of a "qualified applicant:" "Lessee will be responsible for all costs and liabilities related to the rehabilitation, use, operation, security, and maintenance of the House and Lease Area. Lease Area must be maintained to a condition equal to or better than the maintenance of the Park."

Using BidSync, 2479 vendors were invited to submit proposals. As of the bid end date (March 16, 2015), one (1) proposal was received from Heritage Farmstead Association. Following review by the City of Plano Purchasing Office and City Attorney's Office, this proposal has been deemed non-responsive. The proposal states "The Society would seek to match the city's investment." This expectation is in direct conflict with the requirement referenced in the first paragraph of this memorandum.

As there were no proposals that met the RFP criteria, staff recommends that an RFP be released to have the house moved at the expense of the selected proposer. A wood house like this is unlikely to survive in a public park setting and the location of this home, being isolated, poses an even larger risk for arson and vandals. Criteria for selection of a successful proposal will include giving priority to those who intend to keep the house in Plano and/or Collin County, have land to move the house to, and can demonstrate financial means to move and restore the house. The timeline for moving the house will also be a consideration. Until this matter is resolved, the construction documents for the park cannot be completed.

Contract History

- **Original contract dates to 1979**
- **Richardson and Plano were original members. Frisco joined in 1990, Allen in 1991 and McKinney in 1993.**



Contract History

- **Lots has evolved:**
 - Recycling of many waste streams
 - Diversion of yard wastes
 - One-half ton accounting
 - O&M and Debt Service apportionment both use the City's percentage of current year disposal
 - Federal and state regulations have changed



Debt Service

- **O&M expenses by contract are allocated pro rata based on percentage of each City's tons**
- **By contract, Debt Service is to be allocated based using the high year ever of disposal weight. However, it has been allocated like O&M for over 15 years.**
- **This debt service method is problematic for bond holders if a member's tons drops to zero.**



Debt Service

- **New contract specifies Debt Service be allocated based on the higher of:**
 - **Five year rolling average of each City's tons**
 - **25% of the maximum annual tons delivered**
- **Cities prefer this to the previously specified contract method**
- **Debt Service is ~6.4% of the total FY15 Budget**



Significant Changes Recycling

- **The current contract envisions all cities bring everything to NTMWD for disposal to maximize economies of scale**
- **The new contract allows both recyclables and compostables to be removed from the NTMWD waste stream**



Other Contract Changes

- Pursuit of waste conversion strategies
- Wastewater sludge to landfill “at cost”
- Collin County event at member city rate + 10%
- One-half ton accounting for direct haul of construction open tops to the 121 site
- External Operational Audit considered every 5 years at member city discretion
- Contract review at 5 year intervals
- Things moved around; legal-eze updated



Non-Contract Items

- **NTMWD Solid Waste Committee membership**
 - 7 NTMWD board members appointed
 - 4 of 7 will be from Solid Waste Member Cities
 - Policy set in District Policy No. 15
- **Solid Waste CIP Program that generates bond debt service- programmed CIP prominently posted on website... discussed at meetings**



Final Steps

- **All cities have expressed agreement with the contract version provided with the council communication form**
- **Five Cities plan to request their City Councils approval to sign by May**
- **NTMWD Board President will sign after all five cities have signed**
- **Compost agreement will be updated**



Major Thoroughfares








Residential Growth as of 2015







CITY OF PLANO PUBLIC WORKS 2014 COMPLETED ARTERIAL & RESIDENTIAL PAVEMENT WORK



2015 - 2016 ARTERIAL CONCRETE PAVEMENT REHAB PROJECTS





Present Situation

1. Goal is to complete work orders with 30-45 days
2. Use more pavement maintenance projects
3. City staff doing more work than in the past, but further behind.



The Future

- New work order / asset management software – pavement assessment
- Assess pavement condition of the city, 1/3 of the city each year
- Ultra-Thin Asphalt overlay



Why Consider Asphalt

- Extend life of existing street pavement
- Minimize impact of water getting into the subgrade
- Can be constructed quickly, fast application and can be open to traffic quickly
- Reduce noise and hydroplaning over normal asphalt
- Thinner layer requiring less milling
- Can bridge small cracks



Goals

- Reduce time to get utility cuts repaired to 15 days – **Actual 18 days**
- Reduce time to get curbs repaired to 30 days – **Actual 7 days**
- Reduce time to complete all repairs

Subject: May 9, 2015 General Election Voting Locations

Collin County has changed to a "Vote Center" format for the May 9th General Election. The change provides voters the option to vote at any of the 41 county contracted locations on Election day and 29 county contracted locations during early voting, regardless of precinct. This process is similar to the system followed for early voting in the last few election cycles. With this change, Hughston Elementary and Thomas Elementary will not be utilized as voting locations. The County determined these locations were underutilized or in close proximity to other locations.

Denton County will continue with precinct specific voting locations for Election day. Christopher A. Parr Library is the Precinct 2020 voting location. Early voting will continue to be a "Vote Center" format allowing voters to cast their early ballot at any of the 21 county contracted locations, which includes the Christopher A. Parr Library.

Early voting begins April 27th and concludes May 5th for the May 9th Election.
